ONFARM CONNECTIVITY PROGRAM

The Australian Government's <u>OnFarm Connectivity</u> <u>Program</u> (OFCP) has been initiated with \$30 million available over two years to support primary producers in agriculture, forestry and fisheries adopt connected machinery and sensor technology.

Primary producers in agriculture, forestry and fisheries can access a 50% rebate of the cost of eligible equipment, including installation and training, with grants of between \$3,000 and \$30,000 (excluding GST).

The OFCP covers digital technologies such as water flow and pressure monitors, monitoring systems and pump controllers as well as associated connectivity equipment. Applications for Round 1 are open now and rebates will be awarded to eligible applicants on a first come, first served basis in order of application receipt. \$15 million is available to 30 June 2024, or until funding is exhausted.

NEW STUDY INVESTIGATING WAYS TO GROW AND RETAIN WOMEN IN THE NORTHERN TERRITORY SEAFOOD INDUSTRY

Charles Darwin University (CDU) researchers will investigate the role of women in the commercial seafood industry in the Northern Territory. The study is a partnership between Charles Darwin University and the Australian Government through the Fisheries Research and Development Corporation (FRDC), the Northern Territory Seafood Council (NTSC) and Women in Seafood Australasia (WISA).

The landmark study aims to understand the various ways in which women have participated in the NT seafood industry, explore barriers for engagement and the factors that might help the industry become more gender inclusive, robust and viable.

CDU Professor of Environmental Science <u>Natasha Stacey</u> said the research will help to understand barriers to current workforce participation and opportunities for growth in the NT.

It is estimated that some 25 per cent of the Australian seafood industry workforce are women. "The seafood industry is an important contributor to the NT's economy, jobs, and food security and women's contributions to the sector have been substantial but inadequately researched," Professor Stacey said.
